Your answers to language questions in the census have an impact on bilingual services and activities in your community.

Governments, municipalities and community organizations use language data from the census to plan where and how to offer French-language or bilingual services. Day camps, recreation programs, schools, and other community services all rely on data from the census.



In addition, if you or your spouse have received part of your education in French, your children have the right to receive their education in French. This year, there's a new question to help determine how many people have this right.

Is your spouse a Francophone? Do your kids speak French and/or go to a French-language school? Here's what you need to know before you fill out the census on May 11.



The census addresses four overarching themes regarding language.

Mother tongue. The census will ask you about the first language each person in your household learned in childhood and still understands.

Language knowledge. The census will ask about which official language (French, English) each member of your household can understand well enough to hold a conversation.

Language use. The census will ask what languages each person in your household speaks regularly at home. Is one of those languages spoken most often?



Education. The census will ask what language each person in your household received their education in. If you or your partner received your education in French in a bilingual school or via a French-language class in an English-language school, it still counts as French-language education.
